Introduction

This report describes the work accomplished under the Pre-Academic Program for SENACYT Scholars (PAPSS) during project period June 2014-June 2015. The mission of PAPSS is to prepare participating scholars for college success at the University of Arkansas. Under this mission PAPSS focused on the following areas:

- (1) Enrollment management;
- (2) Partnership and budget management;
- (3) Scholar orientation and academic adjustment;
- (4) Scholar progress and recognition;
- (5) Campus and community programming; and,
- (6) Program evaluation.

1) Enrollment management

- Total PAPSS participants: 108 (18 new scholars)
 - o Group 1 & 2-32 students enrolled full-time at the University of Arkansas during the 2014-2015 academic year.
 - o Group 3- 5 students enrolled full-time at Spring International Language Center (SILC) for Fall 1, August 2014; 11 enrolled part time SILC and part time University of Arkansas, 8 enrolled full-time at the University of Arkansas during the Fall term, 2014.
 - Group 4- 29 students enrolled full-time at the University of Arkansas during the Spring term, January 2015
 - Group 5- 18 students enrolled full-time at Spring International Language Center (SILC) during the spring term, January 2015.

2) Partnership and budget management

- Patricia Gamboa, Lynn Mosesso, and Brian Hill visited Panama City on December 2014 and met with SENACYT/IFARHU, Education USA Panama, and PAPSS parents and scholars.
- PAPSS staff submitted official transcripts, enrollment verification, Pat Walker Health Center receipt, and enrollment summary for summer 2014, fall 2014 and spring 2015 to SENACYT/IFARHU for all scholars.
- Lynn Mosesso submitted student budgets to SENACYT representatives for Group 4 Phase III.
 Mayra Torres submitted budgets for Group 5 Phase III.
- Melissa Jean Erwin, financial manager, maintained the program budget, and posted payments on student accounts.

3) Scholar orientation and academic adjustment

- PAPSS staff coordinated with SILC to provide new scholars airport pickup, temporary housing, dorm move-in, and orientation for fifty-one (51) scholars. Fifty-one (51) scholars attended SILC Orientation.
- Eighteen (18) scholars completed the Compass Exam Spring 2015.
- Eighteen (18) new scholars resided in UA housing and had an American roommate during the academic year.
- Michael Rau maintained the University of Arkansas PAPSS Program Facebook. The program used an email newsletter "PAPSS Newslink," Blackboard Learn Announcements, <u>University of Arkansas</u> <u>PAPSS Program Facebook</u>, and UARK email to disseminate information to scholars, parents, and partners.
- PAPSS partnered with the Enhanced Learning Center to offer basic study skills training, personal tutoring and supplemental instruction for high demand courses, some include: math, chemistry, English composition, physics, business law, data analysis, and principals of accounting.
- PAPSS partnered with the Freshman Engineering Program (FEP) to offer peer mentoring.
- Group 4 and Group 5 scholars are matched with currently enrolled Group 1 and 2 scholars through the PAPSS Peer Mentor Program.

4) Scholar progress and recognition

- Twenty-Two (22) Scholars were enrolled in Phase I & II full-time at Spring International Language Center, as of spring 2015.
- Sixty-Seven (67) Scholars are enrolled in Phase III, full-time degree seeking undergraduate students at the University of Arkansas. The retention rate for the program is 100%. The scholars enrolled in 935 hours during the spring term, 2015.
- PAPSS scholars are highly involved on campus. Some have received several awards.







• PAPSS scholars maintained an average 3.06 GPA. PAPSS Scholars maintained a cumulative GPA of 3.18 for the spring term, 2015. 62.68% maintained a 3.50 GPA or higher (42 of 67); while 21% have lower than a 3.50 but higher than a 3.00 cumulative GPA (14 of 67) after the summer term, 2014.

• PAPSS scholars attended a nine day math boot camp, spring 2015. Six-teen students placed out of 94 credit hours of mathematics classes (a total of 31 math courses), with every student testing out of MATH0003 (Beginning and Intermediate Algebra) and MATH1203 (College Algebra).



- Scholar academic progress was monitored using UA Success, an advising and tracking software package that enables faculty and staff to view student progress. In addition, the 6 week progress reports and SILC mid-term progress reports were used as early indicators of progress. Students with C or lower in any course were encouraged to attend tutoring or SILC helpdesk.
- The PAPSS program recognized the accomplishments of several scholars:

 - ii. PAPSS Scholars were elected to serve in leadership positions of the Panamanian Student Organization: President, Esteban Miranda, Vice-President, Daniela Arauz Gonzalez, Social Chair, Suellen Ayala, Secretary, John Navarro, Treasurer, and Edgardo Sanchez.
 - iii. Jean Carlos Morales Orocu was awarded a \$500 scholarship to study abroad in Rome
 - iv. Kimberly Alfaro Ortiz conducted a summer internship in Panama with Farmazona in Colon.

5) Campus and community programming

- Thirty-Four (34) scholars attended the fall break socio-cultural activity to Branson, Missouri, November 22, 2014. The trip was coordinated by Michael Rau and included the Hollywood wax museum and Dolly Parton: Dixie Stampede holiday dinner show.
- PAPSS Scholars performed Panamanian Folkloric dances in traditional costumes and hair ornaments at various functions and events.

- Patricia Gamboa maintained office hours at SILC to foster effective relationships with incoming scholars.
- PAPSS staff held regular meetings through the Undergraduate University Success Series. The topics included: Welcome to the 2014-2015 Academic Year, Living in off Campus Housing, and Holiday Celebration.

6) Program Evaluation

Scholars filled out a survey to determine overall satisfaction after the spring term, 2015. This evaluation will direct continuous improvement for the 2015-16 academic year. Data was captured using Survey Monkey online via an email and web link sent directly to 108 scholars with a return rate of 3% (36 complete).

The survey included six multiple choice questions and three open-ended questions which allowed scholars to elaborate on their responses. We find that scholars are mostly satisfied with the Enhanced Learning Center Supplemental Instruction (SI), tutoring, and mentoring. The students enjoy seeing new places and would like to continue socio-cultural trips.


